The authors place Richard's foundations in Cambridge in context and survey in detail his cordial relationship with the University of Cambridge as a whole, his and his wife's generous endowments of Queens', and his continuing interest and care for King's. It is, again, possible to conclude that Richard had a positive appreciation of learning and learned men. The paper concludes with the foundation by Thomas Barowe, Richard's close associate from at least 1471, of a magnificent chantry for his dead master on the anniversary of Bosworth, which involved the entire university in an annual commemoration of their benefactor; Barowe's indenture of 1495 with the university is printed in full for the first time with translation.

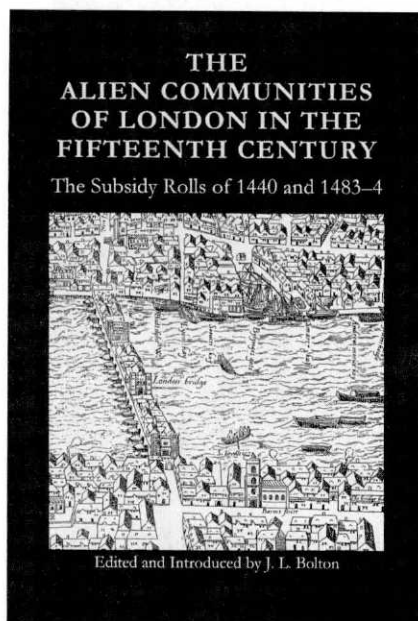

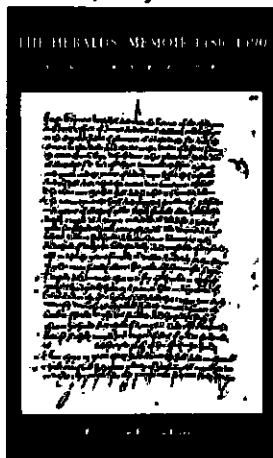
