A list of scribal errors in the manuscript is supplied in Volume Four.

On folio 219 (p. 227) the upper right hand edge has been trimmed, and the letters so lost reinserted in a hand apparently contemporary with the rest of the manuscript. This has affected the first three entries on this folio, and the text has been silently restored. If, as seems likely, the trimming occurred during binding, it provides additional evidence that the first binding of the material was undertaken soon after the end of Richard III's reign.
